Meeting the Needs of Connecticut's Families

Help Preserve Day & Employment Funding for Youth!

Partial funding approved; ongoing cuts to hurt new grads

ALL 2016 graduates will receive Day & Employment Services (DDS) Commissioner Morna Murray confirmed ALL 2016 graduates will receive Day & Employment services. However, the number of days per week new graduates can work is greatly reduced due to budget shortfalls necessitating a 6-month availability of funds versus a full year. The Arc CT and The Arc NLC encourage families and friends to contact local legislators and thank representatives for fighting to keep funding in this budget. Also, please remind lawmakers that current cuts have been incredibly detrimental for people with I/DD and their families. It is critical to ensure all cuts are fully restored in the next budget session and that services are fully funded for the entire year.

Additionally, DDS is in the process of responding to the new Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act (WIOA) of July 22, 2016 which affects people with disabilities age 16-24. This key initiative of the Obama administration replaces the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 and significantly expands job opportunities for people with disabilities by incentivizing employers to diversify the workforce. The initiative also takes aim at sub-minimum wages for people with I/DD, restricting current allowances and significantly limiting the circumstances under which private I/DD service providers and local business are permitted to pay sub-minimum wage.

The Farm Stand's second season is busier than ever. 20,000 square feet of new growing space has nearly doubled crops of squash, beans, peas and peppers. Expanded hours are planned (Monday-Friday 7:30AM-4PM) with a goal of staying open through October. Chef Tom's renowned baked goods also are available.

Currently 6 people from The Arc NLC's Employment Program work at the Farm Stand and aquaponics program, which supplies



specialty lettuce to an area restaurant. The hard-working team is gaining important skills in horticulture, soil testing, equipment maintenance and sales in preparation for competitive-wage retail, culinary and farming jobs in the community. 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
Task Force Works to Prevent Employment Discrimination


CCD Rights appeals to Senator Blumenthal to protect people with I/DD

he Arc US reports that representatives from the Consortium for Citizens with Disabilities (CCD) Rights Task Force, the National Council on Independent Living, Paralyzed Veterans of America, the National Disability Rights Network and others submitted a joint letter to Senator Richard Blumenthal in June "in support of your amendment (#4255) to the fiscal year 2017 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to ensure that organizations and businesses who want to do business with the federal government understand and comply with long-standing laws that protect individuals with disabilities, veterans and others from employment discrimination." The CCD is a coalition representing 57 million Americans with disabilities fighting to "ensure that veterans and people with disabilities are not unfairly denied the opportunity to pursue and attain these jobs."

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"I Like Helping People"

Keith discovers volunteerism . . . and quickly becomes a star volunteer

At 4 a.m. the house is dark and silent, but Keith is already up, volunteer shirt on, ready to make the trip to East Hartford for the "Bubble Run" charity race to benefit the Girls on the Run program. He has asked two of his five housemates to go with him, and he thinks his persistence has paid off, but at the last minute they decide to sleep in.

"Not many people would get up at 4 in the morning to volunteer." Denise Tift, Director of Community Life and Advocacy (CL&A), oversees the Volunteer Corps in which Keith has been



an active member since 2013. Keith is now one of the Corps' key members. "I like helping people," he says.

Keith began to

participate in The Arc's community programming in 2012, beginning with CL&A's recreational activities, which are not only great fun but teach valuable lessons in independence, socialization, communication, and responsibility. **Keith discovered he really, really loved dancing and music.** He began taking drum lessons.

His comfort level and confidence grew. Last year he participated in over 60 sponsored activities and programs and volunteered for 10 Volunteer Corps projects.

From cleanups at Fort Trumbull, Camp Harkness and the Denison Pequotsepos Nature Center to supporting 15,000 racers at the Bubble



Run, Keith embraces every challenge. Lead staff Debbie Densmore witnessed his growth. "Keith is

really focused. Even doing intensive lawn work, or doing what he just did at the race for 6 hours in 100-degree heat, he's the one who doesn't stop until the job's done."

At the Bubble Run Keith gains more fans — two boys pause on the course to hang out with him



till the rest of their group arrives. When they do, the younger boy grabs Keith's legs in a big goodbye bear hug.

"Keith takes a lot of pride in his work."
Debbie says one of his best qualities is the way he shares. "He goes so far beyond what most volunteers would do."

Keith has learned to read people's personal

signals to gauge different social situations. He's become an astute observer and delights in the variety of people he encounters and gets to know. Keith soon falls into step with some other Bubble race volunteers.

Throughout the event he greets runners and gives high-fives to those in the home stretch.

He's already gearing up for The Arc's October 2nd Strides Road Race, one of his favorites. Vision and mobility challenges keep Keith from participating



in football, and running, which he loves. But that doesn't stop him from spending as much time as he can helping folks cross the finish line. That's what makes him a winner.

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Community Partners Make Dreams Come True

The Arc NLC Receives Federal Van Grant

Thanks to assistance from the **Southeastern Council of Governments (SCCOG)**, The Arc NLC won a Federal Transit Administration grant, administered by CT DOT, for a new 6-passenger van to for continuation of **door-to-door services for people requiring wheelchairs and those with limited mobility.**

Eastern Connecticut Chamber Foundation Funds SPARCS Program

The Chamber of Commerce of Eastern Connecticut Foundation awarded \$2,000 to The Arc NLC for a facilitator and program materials to establish the Student Peer Advocates Raising Community Support (SPARCS) program. The innovative program serves adolescents with I/DD age 16-23 transitioning from high school to adult life. The program fosters young people's right to make choices, advocate for themselves on the journey to optimal independence and to responsibly use technology.

Knights' Tootsie Roll Drive Supports People with Intellectual Disabilities

Knights of Columbus Council #12705 in Norwich presented The Arc NLC with \$840 from this year's Tootsie Roll Drive. The popular fundraiser is part of the Knights' Campaign for People with I/DD. Proceeds benefit CL & A, which offers opportunities to volunteer, support groups for survivors of sex abuse, and self-presentation skills for career and life success.

Chelsea Groton Bank Supports Employment

Chelsea Groton Bank continues to support The Arc Farm Stand in Ledyard with a \$1,000 grant for a Troy-Bilt Horse Garden Tiller. The Farm Stand provides on-the-job vocational training in retail, farming, and distribution and offers community neighbors opportunity to buy local, seasonal, fresh produce close to home.

Here's an easy pasta dish combining roasted vegetables, sauce and parmesan cheese that's sure to warm you up as nights get cooler. The Arc NLC's Farm Stand team hopes you'll enjoy this dish as much as they do!

Penne Pasta with Farm Stand Fresh Fall Vegetables

Vegetables you will need:

2 red peppers, 2 zucchini, 1 yellow onion, cut in strips 2 peeled summer squash cut into 4-inch cubes; 4 cremini mushrooms, halved

Preparation:

Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F.

On a baking sheet, toss peppers, zucchini, squash, mushrooms and onions with ¼ cup olive oil, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon pepper, and 1 tsp dried Italian herbs. Mix. Roast until tender, about 15 minutes.

Cook pasta for 6 minutes in boiling water (do not overcook), drain.

In large bowl, toss drained pasta with roasted vegetables, 3 cups marinara sauce, 1 cup grated fontina cheese, ½ cup grated smoked mozzarella, 1 ½ cups frozen peas, thawed, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ tsp. pepper. With wooden spoon, gently mix, until all pasta is coated with sauce and ingredients are combined. Pour pasta into a greased 9 by 13-inch pan. Top with the remaining 1/3 cup Parmesan cheese and 2 tbsps butter, cut into small pieces. Bake until top is golden and cheese melts, about 25 minutes. Yum! 4

ver 120 people attended **The Arc NLC's First Annual Film Festival**, hosted at Norwich Free Academy.



19-year old brother Vince. *Bumblebees* won Best Film of the 2015 Disability Film Challenge. Other films included *Sheri & Paul* (2004), *Distinctively* (2010), and the documentary *Get That Gold* (2014).

A silent and live auction, wonderful food provided by Matthew's Catering and community generosity raised more than \$21,000 for The Arc NLC's CL&A outreach which include a volunteer corps that donated 528 service hours back to Southeastern Connecticut last year, support groups for survivors of sexual abuse, and other vital programs.


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
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
