Surviving the State Budget Battle of 2015 Funding services for people with I/DD competes with providing services

hen Gov. Dannel P.

Malloy proposed cutting critical supports for people with I/DD, The Arc **New London County rallied** at the Capitol in January, February and May. Visits with U.S. Rep. Joe Courtney and Sens. Richard Blumenthal and Chris Murphy followed. Along with services themselves, maintaining funding for people with I/DD and their families assumed

equal priority.

Our Annual Report (thearcnlc.org/pdf/ annualreport.pdf) details on pages 8 and 9 a monthby-month battle for services and a fight for fair wages for our dedicated, professional direct-support team. The Report also highlights The Arc NLC's Quality Service Review Scores, well above state averages (page 26) despite our trials.

How do we do it? Community partners are generous. We work "In Partnership for Full Equality" with families. Our smart team thinks creatively. At The Arc national convention in Indianapolis this month, we will discuss our agency's reinvention amid industry-shaking challenges.

Meeting the Needs of Connecticut's Families

Saving For The Future Is Now Possible

CT passes legislation authorizing tax free savings accounts for families

n June 19,Gov. Dannel P. Malloy signed into law a bill enabling families to create tax-free savings accounts for loved ones with disabilities to help plan for their future.

The new law authorizes the establishment of tax-exempt accounts in the state to help eligible people with I/DD and their families maintain health, independence and quality of life.

The state's legislation was a necessary step so that Connecticut residents can take advantage of the tax-free accounts, which were made possible in December 2014 when the federal Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) Act became law. "The ABLE Act is a good example of how

members of both political parties can work together to craft legislation that benefits people with disabilities, as disability knows no political, geographic, gender or ethnic boundaries" said Peter V. Berns, CEO of The Arc US. The Arc US proved instrumental in the passing and signing of the ABLE act into law.

The funds can cover disability-related expenses including education, housing, transportation, job training and a host of other essential needs. These funds can supplement, not supplant, benefits provided through private insurance, Medicaid, SSI, employment and other sources.

ows of tomatoes, squash, zucchini and lettuce fill the 100 by 100 foot garden outside a residential home in Ledyard, CT. The Arc NLC Farm stand is a new project initiated by people with I/DD and job coaches to create new employment training opportunities. The Farm Stand is an expansion of The Arc's Aquaponics project housed at the same location. The Farm Stand is selling produce grown in - and outdoors at the

roadside stand on Rte. 117. Hours of operation are Monday – Friday, 7:30am-2pm. Produce is shared with The Arc NLC's 14 residential homes to stretch tight grocery budgets just a little farther.

The project provides year round employment training opportunities leading to competitive-wage retail, culinary and farming jobs in the community. This year, The Arc NLC employed 20 people at minimum wage through the Farm Stand project.

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Violence on The Rise for People With Disabilities Shocking statistics on bullying and people with I/DD

he February 2014 Bureau of Judicial Statistics report titled "Crime against People with Disabilities, 2009 - 2012" estimated 1.3 million violent crimes occurred against people with disabilities in 2012, a rate nearly three times higher than the general population.



Factors increasing this rate of violence against people with disabilities include lack of support systems, dependence on an abuser, and physical and social isolation.

Educating both people with disabilities and criminal justice professionals may be the key to preventing violence from rising. Victim Service providers and people with disabilities can create a personal safety plan highlighting who to talk to, contact information for local police department, and one's own personal rules for staying safe.

How Hannah's promposal turned a Stonington senior into a king

itch stood in front of the store mirror and took a selfie. He tugged at his shirt cuffs and carefully buttoned the suit jacket. It was a little loose in the waist and long in the leg, but the grin on his face told everyone that he loved it.

"I am going to the prom!" Mitch, a student attending The Arc NLC's School to Work Transition program through the Employment Transition Center, proudly showed a picture of Hannah's "promposal." Hannah and Mitch have been friends since freshman year. Still, Mitch had no idea

she planned to ask him to the prom. He eagerly said yes, but soon realized he had one very big problem.

Mitch had nothing to wear.

Mitch's mom worried that her son would not be able to attend the prom. She could not afford to rent him a tuxedo. Times are tough and the family needed all their money to

prepare for a move. Mitch would be crushed if he could not attend the prom.

Bonnie Jones, Director of the Employment Transition Center in Groton, was determined that Mitch's prom dream would come true.



Bonnie connected Mitch

with The Arc NLC's Elements of Ellen program, an outreach of Community Life & Advocacy. Elements of Ellen supports people with I/DD to prepare for employment and independent living through the development of social skills, choosing appropriate workplace attire, and self presentation skills.

Mitch was the perfect candidate.

Elements of Ellen coordinator and CL&A Director Denise
Tift met with Mitch to discuss the program. Just a few
weeks from graduation, Denise knew Mitch would
need a suit to attend job interviews and important life
events. She researched local shops to find one that would
fit Mitch with a modern suit he could wear to the prom

and use for many occasions in the future, including job interviews.

"Hannah's dress is blue." Mitch picked out a light blue




shirt to wear with his dark gray jacket and pants. "And I want a vest." Mitch's outfit was slowly coming together. Two stores later, Mitch had a tie and shoes to complete his look.

The next stop was Marinello's Salon in Niantic. "I really need a haircut!" Mitch patted his

shaggy head. "I want to shave it, but my mom would kill me!" Mitch opted for a stylish cut that would be easy to replicate the night of the prom.

Mitch patiently let his mom and sister fuss over him on the big day. His mom styled his hair and made sure

everything was tucked and tied properly. Mitch rode with a friend to the prom, where he met Hannah at the door. The two friends walked in together and spent the first part of the night laughing and dancing with friends.



Just before nine, it was time to crown the king and queen. Mitch stood to the

side with his friends, joking around as the royal court was announced.



Then he heard his name.

Mitch realized his classmates had voted him 2015
Stonington High School Prom King. For a split second
Mitch was frozen in place. He couldn't believe what was happening. Slowly, that same familiar smile spread over his face as his friends pulled him to the center of the room. A

Apple and Horseradish-Glazed Salmon

Ingredients:

- 1/3 cup apple jelly
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh chives
- 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish
- 1 tablespoon champagne vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt, divided
- 4 (6-ounce) salmon fillets (about 1 inch thick), skinned
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons olive oil

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine apple jelly, chives, horseradish, vinegar, and 1/4 teaspoon salt, stirring well

with a whisk.
Sprinkle salmon
with 1/4 teaspoon
salt and pepper.
Heat oil in a large
nonstick skillet
over medium heat.



Add salmon, and cook 3 minutes. Turn salmon over; brush with half of apple mixture. Wrap handle of skillet with foil; bake at 350° for 5 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Brush with remaining apple mixture. #
