Meeting the Needs of Connecticut's Families

Legislative Session Kicks Off With The Arc Connecticut's Family Hearing Day

Hundreds Gather to Speak with Legislators

In a historic turnout of over 30 legislators from both parties, including Senate Minority Leader Len Fasano, House Minority Leader Themis Klaridis, and Speaker of the House Brendan Sharkey, families made their voices heard on the critical need for support for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. "This is the nation's first and

only I/DD caucus" said Senator Beth Bye, D-West Hartford, and caucus co-chair. The message was clear: families need help now. Cuts to Connecticut's Department of Developmental Services far exceed cuts to any other department in the last five years, and families gathered to just say "stop!"

New Report finds that Greater New London's 150 public charities are an Engine for **Economic Well-being throughout the Region**

Local nonprofits fare worse than those in the rest of the state during the Great Recession, further slowing the region's economy

A recent Nonprofit Economic Impact Study (NEIS), authored by economist Stanley McMillen, Ph.D., found that nonprofits providing a variety of health and human services to residents in the region are a key engine for economic health in New London County and the need for these agencies' services continues to grow. But as government economic aid shrinks within the county, local human service agencies are falling behind other regions of the state at an alarming rate.

New London County's health and human service nonprofits - 150 in all - account for more than 11,000 jobs and nearly \$560 million in wages, about seven percent of the area's entire economy.

But the report also found that many of these agencies are at risk. While donor contributions and gifts are up 24 percent statewide, they decreased by an alarming 22 percent from 2006 to 2011 in New London County – at a time when Norwich and New London ranked among the ten cities in America hardest-hit by the Great Recession of 2008.

The report, funded with grants from the Chamber of Commerce of Eastern Connecticut, the United Way of Southeast Connecticut, and the Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut demonstrates the impact non-profits have on workforce development, educational programs, and critical access to healthcare and human services for individuals and families. Moreover, as nonprofits strongly support local commerce, residents and local businesses are equally hard-hit when nonprofits struggle. To read the entire study, please visit TheArcNLC.org. //

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Will Connecticut Close Its Last Institutions? The DD Council and The Arc CT calls for closure of Southbury Training School, regional centers by 2020

Currently in Connecticut, about 500 people with I/DD live

in six regional institutions, including Southbury Training School. The average per-client costs are more than double those of private providers.

In a press conference on November 18, 2014, spearheaded by The Arc Connecticut Executive Director Leslie Simoes and Council on Developmental DD Council Chairper-Disabilities Chairperson Shelagh Mc-Clure, families asked Governor Dannel



son Shelagh McClure

Malloy to close Southbury Training School and the six regional centers for good.

Closing institutions could provide much-needed funding for over 2,000 people currently on the DDS residential waiting and planning lists, lists that continue to grow.

"Connecticut keeps these institutions open even though extremely well-researched longitudinal studies have established that a move from segregation into the community greatly enhances the quality of life of our formerly institutionalized fellow citizens," says McClure in an Op-Ed she and her husband submitted to the CT Mirror. "Enough is enough."

Connecticut's New Age in Farming Local Entrepreneurs help with Aquaponics

When Spencer Curry graduated from college, he never guessed a small desktop aquaponics system would lead to a career.

Curry and his friend, Kieran Foran, decided in 2012 to pursue the idea of indoor farming and aquaponics. When they connected with Matt Braddon shortly thereafter, Fresh Farm Aquaponics was born.

In 2013, the trio approached a local farmer with hopes of expanding their fledgling operations. After a year-long construction project, Fresh Farm Aquaponics'

Conscious Community Garden in South Glastonbury began producing steady crops in the summer of 2014.

The Arc NLC connected with Fresh Farm in November 2014 when Chief Operations and Quality Officer Laurie Herring contacted the group to support The Arc's new aquaponics venture, located in a renovated garage in Ledvard. Together with The Arc NLC team, a layout and growing system was

designed to maximize the space and optimize vegetable production year-round. The Arc NLC completed the system in January and planted its first crops in February 2015.

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Journey To The Center Of The Heart

Renee learns to trust and love again

Renee loves puzzles. "Cat puzzles are my favorite," but really any picture will do. After work, puzzles and Murder She Wrote re-runs help Renee unwind from the day and settle in.

Three years after leaving an abusive husband. Renee, whose name was changed to protect her privacy, finally enjoys the simple things in life. She works three days a week in a restaurant prepping food, washing dishes and sorting mail. Renee spends days off doing puzzles and socializing with friends in the community. She belongs to a

local church. "They are like a family to me." Friends pick Renee up for Sunday service and take her to the ladies group, where she is learning to knit. Renee is convinced that the best is yet to come.

But Renee's life once was different.

For 15 years, Renee tried to hold her marriage together. Her husband was physically and verbally abusive. He hurt her pets to scare her into staying. For a long time, Renee tried to convince herself she could make her husband happy and stop the abuse.

Renee's only family was the man who consistently hurt her. Did she have the strength to walk away?

Renee packed a change of clothes. She put a few pictures from her childhood into a bag. Unsure where to go, Renee turned to her pastor. He suggested she call a local domestic violence shelter. Renee picked up the phone.

All the while, Renee dreamed of a home of her own. With support from the Department of Developmental Services, Renee found an apartment and learned to take the city bus. She got a job and started paying her own bills. But Renee's journey was just beginning.

Renee needed friends. Someone suggested she sign up for The Arc NLC's Community Life & Advocacy program. Voices, an empowerment group for women who have survived physical, emotional or sexual abuse in their

lifetime, was just what Renee was looking for.

For months, Renee sat silent in the group, listening to other women. She saw the power of the group firsthand. She felt the support of the group's members. **Then, one**

day, Renee spoke.

1 in 4 women will experience domestic violence in her lifetime.

It was a guest speaker at Voices that sparked Renee's breakthrough. During a discussion about the impact of negative feelings, Renee felt like the speaker was talking directly to her. Renee remembers the reason for her silence. "I was holding on to grudges. And it was time to let go."

That night, Renee called her sister. After 15 years, the two had much to catch up on. They talked for hours.

They traded email addresses and vowed to keep in touch. Renee had opened the door to let love in again.

Renee was on a roll. She joined The Arc's Shooting Stars Advocates. She started bowling and signed up for Elements of Ellen, a self improvement class focusing on self presentation and self

esteem. She found herself signing up to attend birthday socials and holiday parties. She made friends.

She built a life.

Today, Renee is ecstatic over a recent visit to her family. She took a train for the first time to visit her sister and brother over the Christmas holidays. "I am excited to be so independent." Renee beams as she talks about reconnecting with her family. "We are already planning a another trip together for the summer."

Renee offers powerful words for those who might be struggling in an abusive relationship. "Keep fighting, keep moving and keep your head up." When Renee smiles, anything seems possible. 4

Me Hearty's Swashbuckling Pirate Stew

Ingredients:

1 pound beef stew meat, cut into

1-inch pieces

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour salt and round black pepper to taste

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 small sweet potato, chopped

4 small potatoes, chopped

1 celery rib, chopped

1 turnip, chopped

2 parsnips, chopped

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

1 tablespoon butter

1 small onion, chopped

3/4 cup pineapple juice

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1/4 cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon crushed garlic

1 cube beef bouillon

3 tablespoons rum



Preparation:

Combine beef, flour, salt and pepper in a resealable plastic bag. Shake to evenly coat the beef. Heat olive oil in a skillet over medium heat. Brown beef in olive oil. Transfer meat into a slow cooker and return the skillet to the heat. Add sweet potato, potato, celery, turnip, and parsnip. Pour vinegar into hot skillet to deglaze the pan, scraping loose particles from the bottom with a spatula; empty into the slow cooker. Return the skillet to the heat and melt the butter. Cook and stir the onion in melted butter until softened; scrape into the slow cooker. Combine pineapple juice, Worcestershire sauce, brown sugar, garlic, beef bouillon, and rum in a small saucepan; cook until bouillon cube dissolves. Pour into slow cooker. Turn slow cooker on High; cook for 1 hour. Switch heat to Low and cook an additional 6 hours.
