What happened? The Arc looked on in shock recently when Gov. Dannel Malloy rescinded yet another pledge to close the state's remaining institution, Southbury. Twenty years after Gov. Lowell Weicker set a path for closure, Malloy reversed it (as did former Gov. John Rowland).

I wrote to the Governor to declare my outrage. I hope you will do the same! In spite of urging from the federal government and demands from many citizens, Connecticut spends obscene numbers of tax-payer dollars to maintain the antiquated concept of large institutions. Southbury is philosophically out of step and financially irresponsible. Let's close Southbury now!

A Plan For Connecticut

New bill provides greater resources for families

A half-million people and families in Connecticut rely on a strong system of human services. In order to provide well rounded and accurate information, The Arc Connecticut is putting forth a bill this legislative season to establish rights of families within the DDS system. The bill will focus on:



Level of Need Assessments: Providing families with greater access to the process of creating LON scores.

PRAT Increases and Denials: Providing families with access to submitted reports and a copy of denials in writing.

Unused DDS Funding: Create a mechanism to allow for savings and unused funds to be placed in a trust that stays within DDS.

The Arc NLC Training, Quick-thinking Manager Saves A Life Nurse Ripley's CPR training helps employee's father

Melissa had just returned home from work at one of The Arc NLC's residential homes. Her father, John, was babysitting her son. Suddenly, Melissa heard a loud noise upstairs. She ran to the bathroom and found her father unconscious on the floor!

Melissa quickly turned her dad on his back. She checked his breathing by putting her head close to his face. Nothing. **Her father's life was on the line.**

Melissa's head raced. "My mind flashed to the CPR training I learned at The Arc." She began chest compressions, hard and fast. Melissa

tilted John's head, pinched his nose and breathed into his mouth until his chest rose three times.

He coughed. Melissa angled his head to the side so he would not aspirate. Within minutes, the ambulance was there. Paramedics took over. "It was my first time doing CPR and I wasn't perfect, but I kept my cool and the training came to me."

Melissa is grateful to The Arc NLC and CPR trainer Michele Ripley, R.N. for the training she received. Recently moving into a manager position at The Arc NLC, Melissa reinforces the importance of training. "It is not just a requirement for the job. This training affected me personally and saved my dad's life." \checkmark

Tattoos and a Pair of Hermit Crabs for Merisha

A young Waterford woman takes charge of her life

Merisha's hot pink walker is hard to miss in a crowd. She slowly walks by an electric wheelchair. Merisha has something else on her mind. **"When I am inside,** I am going to walk," she says with determination

as she walks into The Arc NLC's Employment Transition Center (ETC).

Fifty years ago, Merisha's life would have been very different. Born with Pfeiffer Syndrome and Obstructive Hydrocephalus, Merisha lives with sight and hearing loss and physical disabilities. Once upon a time, Merisha's parents would have

been pressured to put her in an institution. To leave her care to the state. To forget about her.

But Merisha was born in 1993. She went to school in Colchester like everyone else her age. She learned to read. "I had a nurse with me all the time. She helped me with my braces and my tracheostomy. She would even pull up my socks."

Merisha next attended Fitch High School, where she continued to learn and socialize. At 18, she moved into a residential home to begin a transition to adulthood. **But Merisha remained in a wheelchair for much of her day, a nurse by her side.** She was capable of more. And, Merisha knew it.

When Merisha began attending The Arc's School to Work Transition program in 2012, her job coach knew she was capable of more too. Merisha insisted on using a walker instead of an electric wheelchair when she was at her vocational program. As graduation approached, Merisha decided it was time to really take control.

That meant learning to care for her own needs. "I don't need help pulling up my socks. I just didn't

get the chance to do it myself." With her job coach, Merisha took charge. "First my socks."

Merisha worked on learning to walk safely down the street, like you and I. "I would rather walk when I am at the mall." She began watching work out videos at home and following along to build physical strength. She learned to manage her anxiety in stressful situations.

"Loud noises scare me, but stress balls help to keep me calm." Even with all her efforts, a nurse was still by her side. Merisha had one thing left to learn.

It was the tracheostomy that kept a nurse in her life. "I had to learn to manage it myself." With the support of her housemates, and with assistance from her residential support team and The Arc NLC employment team, Merisha learned to handle her tracheostomy herself. "No more nurse!"

Today, Merisha takes care of herself, but not just herself. "I have two hermit crabs, Kermit and Nala. I didn't think 'Miss Piggy' was appropriate." She loves watching Law & Order and Grey's Anatomy. "I hang out with my friends at the Brown Derby (a local bar in Stonington). I even have two tattoos!"

Merisha's life is what she makes it. She loves to bake and spend time with her housemates and friends. "I go to the beach with my mom. That is my favorite thing to do." Her future is hers to design. Thanks to fifty years of advocacy for equal rights for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, Merisha's journey has just begun.

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Plissa saved her father's life (see p. 2) and now she offers up this heart-healthy meal for your loved ones. A squeeze of lemon and a dash of pepper are all it takes to turn ordinary chicken into a zesty, flavorful entree.

Melissa's Heroic Lemon Chicken

Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup (plus 2 tablespoons, if roasting) extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 lemons, divided
- 3 to 4 cloves garlic, finely grated or pasted
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- Salt
- 1 3- to 4-pound chicken, skin removed and cut into 8 pieces

Preparation:



Preheat oven to 450F or a grill or grill pan over medium-high heat. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the olive oil, zest and juice of 1 lemon, garlic and black pepper. Season the chicken well with salt and toss into the bowl. Marinate the chicken for 15 minutes. If roasting, place a large, cast-iron skillet over medium-high heat with 2 tablespoons of olive oil. Sear the chicken, meat side-down until golden brown, about 5 minutes, then turn over and transfer the pan to the oven. Roast until cooked through, about 15 minutes. If grilling, grill chicken until marked and cooked through, 8-10 minutes per side. Squeeze the juice of the remaining lemon over the cooked chicken. *
