Family Hearing Day at the Capitol



"A core function of this government must be helping people with I/DD."

Over 150 people attended a Feb. 7 Family Hearing Day at the Capitol testifying about the **need for critical supports for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) and their families.** The I/DD Caucus,

led by co-chairs Sen. Art Linares, R-Dist. 33, and Rep. John Hampton, D-Dist. 16, heard from families, caregivers, and provider

representatives **imploring legislators to maintain Department of Developmental** Services (DDS) funding and to use existing funds more efficiently, similar to Massachusetts and New Hampshire. The bi-partisan legislative panel, including Rep. Kathleen McCarty, R-Dist. 38, listened as families, some in tears, told stories of heartbreak.

"We live in constant fear," one parent said, expressing exasperation about Connecticut's ambivalence toward essential services "at the core of our humanity." A repeated concern of family members and people with I/DD was the **2,000-person waiting list for housing.** Parent Tom Fiorentino, current president of The Arc Connecticut Board of Directors, was emphatic. **"Our communities are improved by the inclusion of people with I/DD."** ~

We're planning on growing this spring!

The Arc Farm Stand needs a lot of water, so using well water for irrigation is one of this season's goals. And thanks to support from Ledyard's organic Aiki Farms, a water-saving drip system will be installed again, reducing water use and costs by more than 50%. Speaking of water, several new aquaponics initiatives are underway including an expansion accommodating vertical growing towers and optimization of the original grow beds, which now produce record amounts of microgreens for The

Arc's food service programs and community living homes.

Participants rapidly are becoming proficient with the new **Osmobot**, a gift from the **Chelsea Groton Bank Foundation**. The **Osmobot** remotely

monitors water temperature and ph levels via the Internet to keep plants and fish healthy. The possibility of expanding aquaponics into the basement of **Flanders Fish Market in Niantic** at the invitation of owner and Board member **Sen. Paul Formica** also is underway. All options

represent increased opportunity for people with I/DD to receive training and employment experience for great community jobs in green farming.

Later this spring, a larger garden supplying up to 100 paying

community "shareholders" with three seasons' worth of fresh vegetables will be in development on land generously donated by the **Town of Ledyard** for a **CSA (Community Supported Agriculture)** program. «

"I just choose everything!" The more projects Bill has, the happier he is

Bill's shy smile and easygoing manner belie a determination to be as active as possible. Bill has lived with his sister Dawn since their mom died seven years ago. He attended a program in Rhode Island for some time for people with I/DD but he wasn't too happy. "There was nothing to do — I just sat around all day."

"So we came to The Arc and I can't believe the transformation."

Bill is especially happy when he's helping people. "We got him involved in volunteering right away." Debbie Densmore, the new Coordinator of The Arc's Community Life &

After seven years of Bill coming home depressed, his sister Dawn just knew there had to be somewhere better for him. Advocacy program, has a knack for matching people with activities they love — sports, volunteer work, and more.

Bill has fond memories of his grandmother, who took care of him while his mom worked. She taught him to read and to cook— something he still loves to do with his sister. Now, whenever

he gets the chance, he volunteers to help Seniors. Over the holidays, the Volunteer Corps prepared food and gifts for Senior living facilities.

"Of course Bill wanted to go on the Community Life program's scheduled activity the evening before the Senior volunteer outing," and CL&A's Denise Tift certainly wasn't surprised to see him show up. "He got home at — when was it, Bill?"

"After midnight. But that was okay."

As one of The Arc's core group of volunteers, Bill was happy to set his alarm for 5 a.m. to help prepare the Seniors' Holiday Tea. He not only made the food and wrapped gifts, but once everyone was at the residence he served food and visited.

Since coming to The Arc, Bill has made up for lost



time. He works five days a week as a member of the Employment Transition Center's cleaning crew. He's made new friends, and their respect for him is evident. "He really opens up when he's with his friends," says his sister.

Community Partners Make Dreams Come True

We're extremely fortunate to have the support of such amazing foundations and businesses throughout the region. Without your help, many of the services we provide to people with I/DD would not exist.

The Edwin and Mary Lord Foundation's

\$38,000 donation allowed the Lawn/Landscape microbusiness to purchase a new truck, landscape trailer and snowplow for its growing customer base.

Comcast once again provided The Arc with a \$10,000 Digital Literacy grant for IT training, and **The Dime Bank Foundation** awarded The Arc NLC \$1,536 in much-needed transportation funds for the program.

A big thank-you also to the **Elsie Brown Fund** for a generous donation of \$10,000.

The **Anne Capano Charitable Foundation** donated a critical \$4,000 to help maintain two of The Arc's homes.

The women at Cedar Street are deeply grateful to **Lowe's in Waterford** for a donation of an electric range allowing for family celebrations and holiday turkey preparations.


Nick: Are the students interested in learning more? Kim: Yes, people keep asking about what they've learned—

Bill loves to cook (read all about him on page 4), and one of his favorite things to make with his sister Dawn is pizza. But not just any pizza — it has to have *lots of everything*. Try out this easy recipe, using ready-made dough or your own. Either way, it's delicious.

Bill and Dawn's Homemade Pizza with "The Works"

Ingredients:

1 teaspoon olive oil 1/4 pound bulk sausage 1 cup chopped red bell pepper 1 cup sliced button mushrooms 1/2 cup finely chopped onion 1 small garlic clove, minced 1/4 cup sliced, drained ripe olives 3/4 cup bottled pizza sauce 1 1/2 cups (6 ounces) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese



Preparation:

Preheat oven to 450°. Topping: heat 1 tsp olive oil in a heavy medium skillet over medium heat. Cook sausage in hot oil 5 min. or until browned; stir to crumble. Add pepper, mushrooms, and onion; cook 4 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add garlic; sauté 1 minute. Stir in olives; drain sausage mixture on paper towels.

Coat a 12-inch pizza pan with cooking spray. Press dough into pan; place on bottom rack of oven; bake 10 minutes. Brush edges of crust with remaining 1 teaspoon olive oil. Spread pizza sauce over crust; top with sausage mixture and cheese. Place on middle rack of oven. Bake at 450° for 15 minutes. \checkmark
