New ideas for a new era of services...

Community of Practice grant one of just eight in the state

The Arc New London County joins agencies in five states to explore policies, practices, trends and barriers for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities following the award of a Community of Practice grant from Connecticut's Department of Developmental Disabilities.

"Each state will form a team with partners from their service system," said Commissioner Terrence Macy, Ph.D., "including members from self-advocacy and family organizations, universities, education, aging and other organizations."

Funded by the Administration on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (AIDD), the grant allows The Arc NLC and seven other provider agencies in the state to embark on a five-year quest to develop innovative supports that serve

families while simultaneously seeking new efficiencies.

he Arc Connecticut announced the creation of a Legislative Caucus to address issues facing families needing DDS supports now and in the future. Senator Beth Bye (D) West Hartford chairs the caucus. Members include Rep. John Hampton (D) Simsbury, Rep. Jay Case (R) Winsted, Torrington, Colebrook

and Goshen, Sen. Paul Doyle (D) Cromwell, Middletown, Newington, Rocky Hill and Wethersfield, Rep. Mike Demicco (D) Farmington, Rep. Jason Rojas (D) East Hartford and Manchester and Rep. Ed Vargas (D) Hartford.

A Family Hearing Day, held on February 7 in Hartford, proved a phenomenal success when over 400 families, people with I/DD, and advocates poured into the Capitol from across the state to share their stories and listen to the struggles of peers. Elderly parents expressed concerns about where their children will live when they die, and siblings as young as 14 questioned how they would afford to care for their brother or sister if there was no support from DDS. Senators and Representatives listened intently to each speaker, some expressing the same tearful emotion as the audience.

The Families Who Built The Arc

Founders share memories, stories that shaped a movement

'm sorry, but your son will never learn." Lily Mastronunzio heard the pediatrician's words, but she did not believe what he was saying. Marty was so young. He had so much life ahead of him. How could the doctor know what Marty could do in his lifetime?

Lily refused to listen to the doctor. Day after day, she held Marty's small face next to hers so he could hear and feel the sounds of letters coming out of her mouth. She read to him, taught him bible verses, and fed his love of classical music. And Marty did learn. Marty loved everyone he met and Marty made a difference-not just in his family but with all who knew him.

This is just one story about the families who built The Arc New London County and why they needed to build it...

Before the Education for All Handicapped Children Act was passed in the 1970s, young people with intellectual and developmental disabilities were unwelcome in our public schools. In response, a group of parents who knew that their children with intellectual and developmental disabilities had worth and potential met in a Groton, Connecticut, living room in 1952 and passed a hat. They collected \$10.69 to fund an education program for their children. And they sparked a social and civil rights movement that drives The Arc New London County today.

"First they called it mongoloid, then they called it retarded and then they called it developmentally disabled and now it is a person with a disability." Mrs. Betty Demicco, a founding member of The Arc NLC now in her 90's, remembers. Her son, Donnie, was born with Down Syndrome. Betty and the handful of other parents who sat in that Groton living room

decided it was time for change, serious change. As taxpayers, they believed their children had every right to go to school. "I just wanted a fair shake for Donnie," Betty Demicco says. "We weren't trying to do something big. We just wanted to do something for our children." By 1952, 46 of the 48 states had enacted legislation for educating children with I/DD, although children with severe and moderate disabilities were excluded from these benefits. The Arc's founding families had no idea that their efforts would ignite an international movement of equality and inclusion for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and lead to laws that changed lives for thousands of families.

"I drove that bus all over the place!" Betty Demicco laughs as she recalls driving throughout Southeastern Connecticut taking her son and the children of the other founding members to activities and learning opportunities of all kinds. Though Donnie passed away in 2006, a tear rolls down Betty's face as she remembers his sense of humor and the joy he got out of interacting with friends.

By the 1960s, The Arc movement was gaining momentum. Families like the Mastronunzios eagerly jumped on board. Like Donnie Demicco, Marty was born with Down Syndrome. This, combined with a serious heart condition, kept him out of school more often than not. Marty's seven siblings brought their lessons home and taught him to speak. They would playfully urge him to say one word, then two, until he was able to form a sentence. In return,

Marty showed his family how to appreciate the simple joys of life. He taught them compassion, patience and how to look for the good in people. "In many respects," Lily Mastronunzio said, "Marty taught us more than we ever could have taught him."

"It's a good time to remember the parents who stepped forward when their children were not even welcome in our public schools to build dreams never before thought possible," says Kathleen Stauffer, CEO of The Arc NLC. Here, The Arc NLC salutes the struggles of our founding families and expresses gratitude for the commitment to full inclusion that they made for all people more than 60 years ago.

From Our Kitchen to Yours

he Arc New London County loves potluck suppers. CIP supervisor Bonnie Jones is famous for her lasagna, and everyone looks forward to enjoying her culinary creativity. Try her recipe for yourself and you, too, can be the hit of the next potluck!

Ingredients:

- Sauce (homemade or 1-2 jars)
- 1lb ground beef
- 1lb lasagna noodles
- Ricotta cheese
- 2 eggs
- Seasonings (salt, pepper, oregano)
- Mozzarella cheese
- Parmesan cheese

Directions:

Cook meat completely and add the entire panful to the pot of sauce. If the sauce is too thin, you can add a can of tomato paste. While the sauce is simmering, cook the lasagna noodles (al dente' as they will cook in the

oven) drain and set aside. In a mixing bowl, mix ricotta cheese, two eggs and seasonings.



Layer the lasagna - noodles first, ricotta cheese next, then meat sauce. Sprinkle mozzarella cheese on top of meat sauce, then start over and layer again until the pan is filled. Cover with aluminum foil and bake at **350° for 30-40 minutes**. Last, remove the foil and sprinkle with more mozzarella and parmesan and cook for five additional minutes so the top is covered in melted cheese. Let stand for five minutes.

Serve and enjoy!
